## AN ACT CONCERNING THE BEHAVIORAL AND MENTAL HEALTH POLICY OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

Section 1. Section 2-137 of the general statutes is repealed and the
 following is substituted in lieu thereof (*Effective October 1, 2023*):

3 (a) There is established a Children's Behavioral and Mental Health 4 Policy and [Oversight] Planning Committee. The committee shall 5 evaluate the availability and efficacy of prevention, early intervention, 6 and mental health treatment services and options for children from birth 7 to age eighteen and make recommendations to the General Assembly 8 and executive agencies regarding the governance and administration of 9 the mental health care system for children. The committee shall be 10 within the Legislative Department.

11 (b) The committee shall consist of the following members:

(1) The chairpersons and ranking members of the joint standing
committees of the General Assembly having cognizance of matters
relating to public health, human services, children and appropriations

15 and the budgets of state agencies, or their designees;

16 (2) Three appointed by the speaker of the House of Representatives, 17 one of whom shall be a member of the General Assembly and two of 18 whom shall be providers of mental, emotional or behavioral health 19 services for children in the state;

(3) Three appointed by the president pro tempore of the Senate, one
of whom shall be a member of the General Assembly and two of whom
shall be representatives of private advocacy groups that provide
services for children and families in the state;

24 (4) One appointed by each of the two legislative chairpersons of the
 25 committee, selected pursuant to subsection (e) of this section;

26 [(4)] (5) Two appointed by the majority leader of the House of 27 Representatives, who shall be representatives of children's hospitals;

[(5)] (6) One appointed by the majority leader of the Senate, who shall
be a representative of public school superintendents in the state;

30 [(6)] (7) Two appointed by the minority leader of the House of 31 Representatives, who shall be representatives of families with children 32 who have been diagnosed with mental, emotional or behavioral health 33 disorders;

34 [(7)] (8) Two appointed by the minority leader of the Senate, who 35 shall be providers of mental or behavioral health services;

[(8)] (9) The Commissioners of Children and Families, Correction,
Developmental Services, Early Childhood, Education, Insurance,
Mental Health and Addiction Services, Public Health and Social
Services, or their designees;

40 [(9)] (<u>10)</u> The executive director of the Office of Health Strategy, or
41 the executive director's designee;

42 [(10)] (11) The Child Advocate, or the Child Advocate's designee;

43 [(11)] (12) The Healthcare Advocate, or the Healthcare Advocate's 44 designee;

45 [(12)] (13) The executive director of the Court Support Services 46 Division of the Judicial Branch, or the executive director's designee;

[(13)] (14) The executive director of the Commission on Women,
Children, Seniors, Equity and Opportunity, or the executive director's
designee;

50 [(14)] (<u>15)</u> The Secretary of the Office of Policy and Management, or 51 the secretary's designee; and

52 [(15)] (<u>16</u>) One representative from each administrative services 53 organization under contract with the Department of Social Services to 54 provide such services for recipients of assistance under the HUSKY 55 Health program, who shall be ex-officio, nonvoting members.

(c) Any member of the committee appointed under subdivisions (1)
to [(7)] (8), inclusive, of subsection (b) of this section may be a member
of the General Assembly.

59 (d) Any vacancy shall be filled by the appointing authority.

60 (e) The chairpersons of the committee shall be the Secretary of the 61 Office of Policy and Management, or the secretary's designee, and [a] 62 member] two members of the General Assembly [selected jointly] one 63 <u>each selected</u> by the speaker of the House of Representatives and the 64 president pro tempore of the Senate from among the members serving 65 pursuant to subdivision (1), (2) or (3) of subsection (b) of this section. 66 shall be co-chairpersons of the committee. Such co-chairpersons The 67 three chairpersons shall schedule the first meeting of the committee, 68 which shall be held not later than [sixty days after May 4, 2022] October 69 1, 2023.

(f) Members of the committee shall serve without compensation,
except for necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their
duties.

(g) Not later than January 1, 2023, the committee shall report, in
accordance with section 11-4a, to the joint standing committees of the
General Assembly having cognizance of matters relating to
appropriations and the budgets of state agencies, public health, human
services and children, and the Secretary of the Office of Policy and
Management, regarding the following:

79 (1) Any statutory and budgetary changes needed concerning the 80 mental health system of prevention, development and treatment that 81 the committee recommends to [A] improve developmental, mental 82 health and behavioral health outcomes for children; (B) improve 83 transparency and accountability with respect to state-funded services 84 for children and youth with an emphasis on goals identified by the 85 committee for community-based programs and facility-based 86 interventions; and (C) promote the efficient sharing of information by 87 state and state-funded agencies to ensure the regular collection and 88 reporting of data regarding children and families' access to, utilization 89 of and benefit from services necessary to promote public health and 90 mental and behavioral health outcomes for children and youth and their 91 families; [.]

92 (2) (A)The gaps in services identified by the committee with respect
93 to children and families involved in the mental health system,
94 and recommendations to address such gaps in services;

(3) (B) Strengths and barriers identified by the committee that support or
impede the mental health needs of children and youth with specific
recommendations for reforms;

98 (4) (C)An examination of the way state agencies can work collaboratively
99 through school-based efforts and other processes to improve mental
100 health and developmental outcomes for children;

101 (5) (D)An examination of disproportionate access and outcomes across
102 the mental health care system for children of color;

103 (6) (E)An examination of disproportionate access and outcomes across

104 the mental health care system for children with developmental105 disabilities;

(7) A plan to ensure a quality assurance framework for facilities and
programs that are part of the mental health care system and are operated
privately or by the state that includes data regarding efficacy and
outcomes; and

(8) A governance structure for the children's mental health system
that will best facilitate the public policy and healthcare goals of the state
to ensure that all children and families can access high-quality mental
health care.

114 (h) The committee shall complete its duties under this section after 115 requesting consultation with one or more organizations that focus on 116 the quality of services for children or research related to the well-being 117 of children, including, but not limited to, The Child Health and 118 Development Institute or Connecticut Voices for Children. The 119 committee may accept administrative support and technical and 120 research assistance from any such organization. The committee shall 121 work in collaboration with any results-first initiative implemented 122 pursuant to any section of the general statutes or any public or special 123 act.

(i) (h)The committee shall be given access to data collected by the
state on matters related to children's behavioral health from the
relevant state agencies or directly from contracted
administrative service organizations, as applicable.

(j) The committee shall include two or more subcommittees chaired
by a member of the committee to inform its recommendations. The
subcommittees may focus on: Workforce-related issues, school-based
health, prevention, and intermediate or acute care. All subcommittees
shall examine gaps, reimbursement rates, parity in the outcomes of
services and the efficacy of services.

making follow-up reports on the status or progress of the committee's recommendations and activities. Each report submitted by the committee pursuant to this subsection shall include specific recommendations to improve outcomes related to children's mental, emotional or behavioral health and a timeline indicating dates by which specific tasks or outcomes should be achieved.

(l) The committee shall develop a strategic plan that integrates the
recommendations identified pursuant to subsection (g) of this section.
The plan may include short-term, medium-term and long-term goals. In
developing the plan, the committee shall collaborate with any state
agency with responsibilities relating to the mental health system.

(m) (j) Not later than August 1, 2023, the committee shall report, 146 147 in accordance with section 11-4a, such plan together with an account of progress made toward the full implementation of such plan and 148 149 any recommendations concerning the implementation of identified 150 goals in the plan to the joint standing committees of the General Assembly having cognizance of matters relating to appropriations and 151 the budgets of state agencies, public health, human services and 152 153 children, and the Secretary of the Office of Policy and Management.
